EUROPE AND ISLAM — FEARS AND REALITIES

Terror attacks in France, Brussels, and elsewhere have heightened European anxieties over Islam to the point where Euro-centric nationalism has become a dramatic concern in its own right. Islamophobia – as many Europeans and Americans are coming to realize – is usually linked to anti-Semitism, and is often proto-fascistic. It's a complex and alarming situation. We'll try to sort through the actual reasons for European fears and the somewhat lessalarming realities of the modern encounter of Islam and the West in Europe.

THE SECOND REVOLUTION

Joseph Ellis' The Quartet: Orchestrating the Second American Revolution, 1783-1789 focuses the attention of one of our premier historians of early America on the shaping of the Constitution and the new republic. The New York Times called it a "wonderfully immediate and gripping account of the founders' efforts to transform the freedom won in the war for independence into an enduring nationhood." But this is a departure from Ellis' acclaimed earlier works celebrating the individual and collective achievements of the founders. In The Quartet, he takes on "the second founding" and the "second revolution." He recounts the extraordinary efforts of George Washington, Alexander Hamilton, John Jay, and James Madison to persuade the states to relinquish a measure of their sovereignty and to join in the creation of a new federal government with power over their own autonomy. So much of our modern political landscape is drawn along lines etched in those critical years.

WHY THE CIVIL WAR STILL MATTERS

The 2016 presidential race should make it clear to all thoughtful observers that the eddies of the American Civil War still swirl. James McPherson, the preeminent historian of that war and the author of *The War that Forged a Nation*, writes that "the tragic irony of the Civil War is that both sides professed to fight for the heritage of liberty bequeathed to them by the Founding Fathers." And that tragedy resonates

today in racial inequality and intolerance, in the political intransigence that has all but frozen our governing process, in the painful division of our country into Red and Blue factionalism, in questions of states' rights and national governance, and in the disturbing rise of demagoguery. To understand this complex yet interwoven array of issues, we need to look to the Civil War.

THE 2016 CAMPAIGN

As this CG Bulletin goes to press, the odds seem almost overwhelming that Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton will be the nominees of the Republican and Democratic parties. There are, of course, other possibilities. Bernie Sanders could conceivably effect an upset of extraordinary proportions. More possible (though still unlikely) is a successful bid by anti-Trump forces in the GOP either to block his nomination or to send an "independent" candidate into the fray. Whatever happens, it's clear that the 2016 campaign is a watershed and that it may yet change American politics forever. That's the story we'll be pursuing, and we'll touch all the bases, from "populism" to political violence, from Wall Street to the new voices on the left, from racial tension to white nationalism, and from party politics to party implosion.

Has there ever been a better teacher than Joseph Campbell? Jim thinks it's unlikely. He was the preeminent scholar of the world's mythic traditions. He brought to his study the insight of a literateur, the eye of an artist, and the soul of a seeker. We'll follow Campbell's bliss as we inquire into the power of myth.

The Didache (did-a-kay), a brief early Christian treatise, dates from the mid to late first century. Its importance is highlighted by the fact that some church fathers pushed to

include it in the New Testament. Written perhaps even before the first gospel, the book's version of ritual and belief both agrees and clashes with that found in the New Testament – making for intriguing and enlightening study.

DIGGING IN GOD'S GARDEN — ARCHAEOLOGY AND THE BIBLE

Archaeology in the Middle East has had a profound impact on reading the Bible. Our focus will be on written material uncovered over the last century, but we will also take into consideration what we have learned about the way life was lived in the biblical period.

JULY 6 • ANNA TRUMBORE JONES THE PLACE OF VIOLENCE IN **ROMAN AND MEDIEVAL CHRISTIANITY**

In the earliest centuries, Christian identity was largely shaped by Christians' status as victims of violence. Indeed, some early Christians argued that to be a Christian - to be Christlike – was by definition to die violently. Christian authors reveled in imagery that subverted expectations about the meaning of power, victory, and life. All this changed, however, with the conversion of the emperor Constantine. How did Christians adapt to holding political power, which brought with it the need to use force? What did an ideal Christian ruler look like, down the centuries? How did Christians become persecutors of other faiths? And how did they determine what types of violence were acceptable or even praiseworthy, and what forms were unjust? We will explore the complex conversations Christians had about the proper role of violence in their faith in the first millennium of its existence.

The Didache (Did-a-kay), a brief early Christian treatise, dates from the mid to late first century. Its importance is highlighted by the fact that some church fathers pushed to include it in the New Testament. Written perhaps even before the first gospel, the book's version of ritual and belief both agrees and clashes with that found in the New Testament – making for intriguing and enlightening study.

MAY 5 • JIM KENNEY EUROPE AND ISLAM — FEARS AND REALITIES

Terror attacks in France, Turkey, and elsewhere have heightened European anxieties over Islam to the point where Euro-centric nationalism has become a dramatic concern in its own right. Islamophobia – as many Europeans and Americans are coming to realize – is usually linked to anti-Semitism, and is often protofascistic. It's a complex and alarming situation. We'll try to sort through the actual reasons for European fears and the somewhat less-alarming realities of the modern interface of Islam and the West in Europe.

JUNE 2 • AHMAD SADRI THE RELIGIONS OF ANCIENT PERSIA AND THE ABRAHAMIC FAITHS

The pre-Islamic religions of Iran have had a deep and lasting influence on the Western religions of the world. These ideas have shaped the messianic and end-time expectations of Judaism, Christianity, and Islam.


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

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


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
